

Anselm Eldergill FMHC

Anselm Eldergill is a judge in the Court of Protection and a member of the United Nations Expert Judicial Group on Capacity and Access to Justice. He is also an Honorary Professor of Mental Capacity Law at University College London.



He was a solicitor who specialised in mental health law for 25 years before becoming a judge. Much of his work involved representing people who were detained under the Mental Health Act 1983. However, he also worked as a consultant for Eversheds NHS team, was a Mental Health Act Commissioner and chaired many independent NHS inquiries following homicides and suicides. For many years he was President of the Mental Health Lawyers Association and President of the Institute of Mental Health Act Practitioners.

His other roles have included chairing the Mental Health Act Commission Law & Ethics Committee and heading the Commission's Statutory Complaints Investigations; serving as the legal member of the Mental Health Commission for Northern Ireland; providing advice and training to the Mental Health Commission in Dublin and serving on government reviews of mental health legislation.

He has lectured and written extensively on mental health law and policy. His publications include *Mental Health Review Tribunals — Law & Practice* (Sweet & Maxwell, lxxvii, 1333 pages); *Court of Protection Handbook* (Co-author, LAG, London, 928pp, 2014, 3rd ed. due 2018); *Mental Health Law* (The Law Society, London, 2019); *The Patient's Voice* (Ed. J Young-Mason, Davis & Co, Philadelphia, 2015); and *Compassion and the Law: A Judicial Perspective* (Elder Law Journal Vol. 5 No. 4, November 2015, pp 392-398).
